The studio is peppered with Victorian and Neo-Gothic furniture; Mr. Slonem owns 300 chairs alone. He says the time period is often overlooked by designers because it seems "creepy," but the "finials and arches all point up to God." He began a series of paintings about Abraham Lincoln a decade ago, shortly after he bought an 1873 home called Cordts Mansion in Kingston, N.Y., where former presidents, including William McKinley, visited. He now owns more than 150 top hats.
